²The **time period of interest** is listed at the top of the Risk/Exposure/Control & Prevention question package of enteric disease events. It often is the incubation period for the pathogen, but may vary (e.g., the incubation period for salmonellosis is 6 hours to 6 days, but the widely used time period for evaluating exposures is 7 days).
